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



The project will use a mixed methods approach, using quantitative and qualitative data to assess the impact of Medicaid expansion across health systems and stakeholder groups in underserved areas of Missouri with a focus on health equity.

We are in the planning phase of the project. With the delay of expansion in Missouri and the slow start to enrollment for newly eligible Missourians, the project will pick up speed in early 2022. In the meantime, CHEP has launched their [Missouri Medicaid Enrollment Dashboard](#) to share the latest numbers for enrollment in Missouri Medicaid.

It covered [eight ways to make visuals and information more accessible, as well as considerations for equity in data communication](#).

The Evaluation Center provides opportunities for [Cigna Foundation's Healthier Kids For Our Future®](#) grantees to participate in online trainings on a host of topics aimed at increasing skills and capacity for evaluation. The Evaluation and Learning Series was conceptualized as a way of building general grantee capacity for evaluation by providing knowledge on evaluation topics that stand out as an area of need or interest for grantees. 
The Evaluation Center is looking forward to working with our new partners:

My favorite cuisine is Italian (I love pasta and a good salad). However, my favorite dish is my father's jambalaya.




